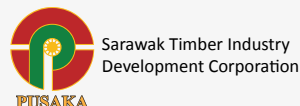

OVERVIEW

Timber; flexible, structurally strong and being the lowest embodied carbon of any commercially available commodity; contributes \$600 billion to the global economy and that translates to 1% of global total GDP. According to the World Bank's forecast, the global demand for timber will quadruple by 2050. The market foresees major changes in the regional supply of and demand for wood fiber over the next two decades which will impact both international markets and other producers around the globe.

Southeast Asia itself has extensive tropical hardwood resources and wood processing industries, and is a major supplier of hardwood logs and woodchips. 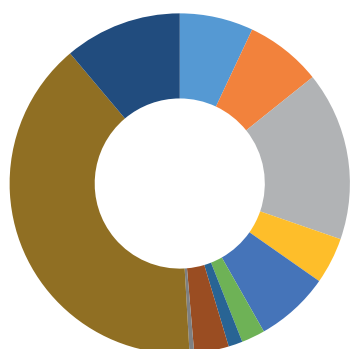

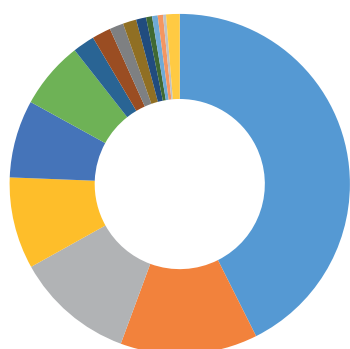

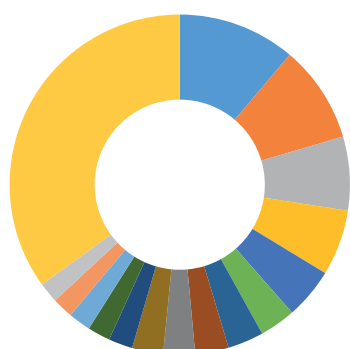

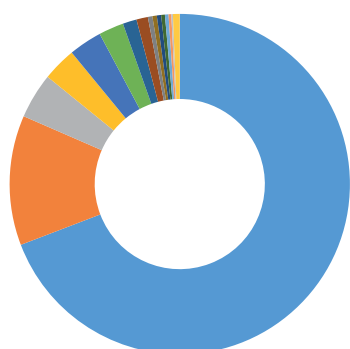

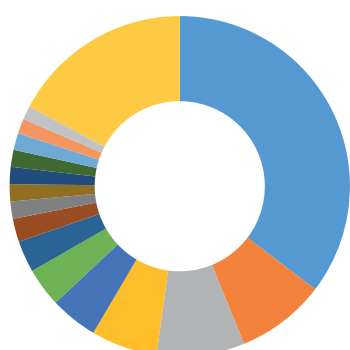

SESSION 1: GLOBAL TIMBER OUTLOOK: DEMAND, SUPPLY AND PROSPECTS

The new Trump administration called for "America First" and for "Buy American, Hire American". The Trump administrative also has withdrawn from the Trans-Pacific Partnership, an agreement among twelve countries across three continents and looking to impose a tax on all imports to the United States. Meanwhile, the United Kingdom has recently voted for Brexit referendum to leave the EU, which will posed restrictions of the movement of goods. Ironically, China-backed Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP); 10 Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) and six countries with which the bloc has existing free trade pacts: China, India, Japan, South Korea, Australia and New Zealand signaled their intent to finalize the pact by the end of this year. The main aim of the session is to analyses how the chained of these events will impact the global economy and the major trade currencies, and its impact on the demand and supply of timber and timber product industry.

SESSION 2: GENOMICS AND GOOD SILVICULTURAL PRACTICES: THE KEYSTONE TO PRODUCTIVITY AND PROFITABILITY

Selecting the suitable species for the establishment of timber plantation requires careful consideration on the production goal, desired silvicultural and growth characteristics. While indigenous species should be the preferred species, difficult terrain such as steep slopes, and climatic conditions such as strong rainfall, high winds, high temperatures and frequent droughts can impede the use of these species. Where these conditions exist, pioneer or introduced species may be more successful than indigenous species. The main aim of the session is to look at various planting stocks that are suitable, biotechnology application to produce new species, and the adoption of Good Silvicultural Practices that will enhance plantation productivity and profitability.

SESSION 4: ALTERNATIVE RAW MATERIALS TO TIMBER FOR WOOD-BASED INDUSTRIES: DEVELOPMENT AND PROSPECTS

The timber industry would face shortage in supply of quality timber in the near future due to the increasing importance and priority given to the conservation of forests and environment. There are many lesser known species and agricultural by products that can be used as alternatives to supplement current requirements by wood-based industries. Through the various research and development (R&D) initiatives by regional universities and research institutions have successfully identified wood-based products that can be produced from these alternative resources which could help to reduce the industry's dependence on forest and plantation timbers. The main aim of the session is to explore and discuss the technical and market viability of these alternative raw materials for the wood-based industries.

SESSION 5: URBAN TRANSFORMATION IN TIMBER

New timber technology and solutions for fire protection opens for a broader application of wood-based solutions in urban areas. Stronger focus on the environmental properties and the carbon-sequestering potential of building materials places wood at the centre of attention. Sustainable buildings must be designed for long lifecycles. They must have a high and durable architectural and technical quality and they must be adaptable to varied use over time. They must combine generality in room forms with possibilities for flexible partitioning and furnishing. This requires tight coordination of constructions, building envelopes and the systems for water supply, sewage, heating and ventilation. The main aim of the session is to develop strategies for transformations in dense, urban locations using timber as a main material.
